


There is a story about a rooster who would crow in the morning at sunrise. Soon he began to believe that his crowing made the sun rise. This made him very proud. But one day, he crowed, but the sun did not rise. He crowed and crowed, but nothing happened. According to the story, the rooster died exhausted, and broken-hearted one morning. Moral of the story? In our work for the Lord, let us be humble instead of being proud and arrogant (Source: Moments, Fr Jerry Orbos).

In today's gospel we witness the unassuming character of Jesus in his preaching and healing ministries. His fame was spreading like a bushfire, and still, he did not take undue pride in what he had been doing. His heart was throbbing every minute for the poor, and he tried everything to make their lives better, to bring hope to the hopeless etc. He was faithful to the Father till the end even to the extent of stretching his arms on the cross. Taking a close look at the gospel, we can find that Jesus slipped away quietly from the people every time they attempted to put him on the pedestal. He was totally God- Other oriented and never self- oriented or self-absorbed. As we see in today's gospel, Jesus uses his authority to liberate people from the evil forces that dominate their lives, and to bring them the blessings of health and healing, freedom and hope.

He came, as he himself states, 'to serve not to be served, and to give his life for us' (Mk 10:45). Even today, he continues to reflect himself in those who are involved in the pro-life activities, who reach out to the affected mass without expecting anything in return. What a charismatic, effective, powerful, influential leader Jesus was! And he wants us to imitate his example. He is the prototype of all who exercise power and do good deeds in the given context of one's life: family, school, business enterprises, government and so on...

This Sunday's Readings



Entrance Antiphon:

O sing a new song to the Lord; sing to the Lord, all the earth. In his presence are majesty and splendour, strength and honour in his holy place.

First Reading: Deuteronomy 18:15-20

I will raise up a prophet and put my words into his mouth

Moses said to the people: 'The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like myself, from among yourselves, from your own brothers; to him you must listen. This is what you yourselves asked of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the Assembly. "Do not let me hear again" you said "the voice of the Lord my God, nor look any longer on this great fire, or I shall die"; and the Lord said to me, "All they have spoken is well said. I will raise up a prophet like yourself for them from their own brothers; I will put my words into his mouth and he shall tell them all I command him. The man who does not listen to my words that he speaks in my name, shall be held answerable to me for it. But the prophet who presumes to say in my name a thing I have not commanded him to say, or who speaks in the name of other gods, that prophet shall die."

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 94:1-2,6-9

R. If today, you hear his voice, harden not your hearts.

Come, ring our our joy to the Lord; hail the rock who saves us. Let us come before him, giving thanks, who songs let us hail the Lord. *R*.

Come in, let us kneel and bend low; let us kneel before the God who made us for he is our God and we the people belong to his pasture, the flock that is led by his hand. *R*.

O that today you would listen to his voice! 'Harden not your hearts as at Meribah, as on that day at Massah in the desert when your fathers pit me to the test; when they tried me, though they saw my work.' *R*. **Second Reading:** 1 Corinthians 7:32-35 Give your undivided attention to the Lord.

I would like to see you free from all worry. An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need worry about is pleasing the Lord; but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife: he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.

Gospel Acclamation Alleluia, alleluia!

A people in darkness have seen a great light: a radiant dawn shines on those lost in death. **Alleluia!**

Gospel: Mark 1:21-28 They saw where Jesus lived and they stayed with Him.

Jesus and his disciples went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the sabbath came he went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority.

In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.
