

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THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD, YEAR B

Sunday, 12 May 2024



"There's always another level up. There is always another ascension. More grace, more light, more generosity, more compassion, more to shed, more to grow"- Elizabeth Gilbert

A beautiful old story tells of how Jesus, after his Ascension into Heaven, was surrounded by the holy angels who began to enquire about his work on earth. Jesus told them about his birth, life, preaching, death and Resurrection, and how he had accomplished the salvation of the world. The angel Gabriel asked, "Well, now that you are back in Heaven, who will continue your work on earth?"

Jesus said, "While I was on earth, I gathered a group of people around me who believed in me and loved me. They will continue to spread the Gospel and carry on the work of the Church." Gabriel was perplexed. "You mean Peter, who denied you thrice and all the rest who ran away when you were crucified? You mean to tell us that you left them to carry on

your work? And what will you do if this plan doesn't work?" Jesus said, "I have no other plan — it must work." Twenty centuries later, Jesus still has no other plan, He is counting on us. (Mark Link in 'Sunday Homilies')

"Go out into the world and proclaim the Gospel to every creature" is the plan of Jesus for all of us to fulfil. As MARTHALIGAS (Catholic Women Preach) suggests, there may be a lesson for us that we approach the spreading of the Gospel in the same way that the natural world spreads the Gospel to us? Not with words and doctrines and the goal of conversion, but instead with radical presence, radical attention, and a demonstration of what it means to live authentically and with purpose every single day.

Everything in nature proclaims the omnipotent, omniscient presence of God in fulfilling the purpose of its creation. Our invitation, then, is not to tell others how they are to live. Instead, we are called to lean into our own becoming. The more we can learn to live boldly as ourselves, with integrity, with confidence, and with purpose, the more we will become the Body of Christ that our Christian faith compels us to become. This is how we are to evangelize— by demonstrating what it means to be embodied, fully alive, and rooted in purpose.

It is crystal clear that we are the vehicles by which His presence is made manifest. We are to take His presence in the universe to every spectrum of life not limiting Jesus to 'religious matters'.



His presence has to penetrate into our concern for the environment, politics, economics, medicine, culture, morals and so on. Jesus is counting on us that we will be able to make changes and save the planet for the future generations. In every area of existence, we must be witnessing to him. Witness and proclaim are the two key words for the early church: "one was descriptive of what they must be, the other a command as to what they must do" (Thomas O' Laughlin). The conscious experience of Jesus within us should propel us to permeate the presence of Jesus into every fibre of the society at large.





This Sunday's Readings

Entrance Antiphon:

Men of Galilee, why gaze in wonder at the heavens? This Jesus whom you saw ascending into heaven will return as you saw him go. Alleluia.

First Reading: Acts 1:1-11

Why are you standing here looking into the sky? Jesus has been taken into heaven.

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is' he had said 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 46:2-3, 6-9

R: God mounts his throne to shouts of joy: a blare of trumpets for the Lord.

All peoples, clap your hands, cry to God with shouts of joy!
For the Lord, the Most High, we must fear, great king over all the earth.

God goes up with shouts of joy; the Lord goes up with trumpet blast. Sing praise for God, sing praise, sing praise to our king, sing praise.

God is king of all the earth.
Sing praise with all your skill.
God is king over the nations;
God reigns on his holy throne.

Second Reading: Ephesians 4:1-13

To the measure of the full stature of Christ.

I, the prisoner in the Lord, implore you to lead a life worthy of your vocation. Bear with one another charitably, in complete selflessness, gentleness and patience. Do all you can to preserve the unity of the Spirit by the peace that binds you together. There is one Body, one Spirit, just as you were all called into one and the same hope when you were called. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God who is Father of all, over all, through all and within all.

Each one of us, however, has been given his own share of grace, given as Christ allotted it. It was said that he would:

When he ascended to the height, he captured prisoners, he gave gifts to men.

When it says, 'he ascended', what can it mean if not that he descended right down to the lower regions of the earth? The one who rose higher than all the heavens to fill all things is none other than the one who descended. And to some, his gift was that they should be apostles; to some, prophets; to some, evangelists; to some, pastors and teachers; so that the saints together make a unity in the work of service, building up the body of Christ. In this way we are all to come to unity in our faith and in our knowledge of the Son of God, until we become the perfect Man, fully mature with the fullness of Christ himself.

Gospel Acclamation Alleluia!

Go and teach all people my gospel.

I am with you always, until the end of the world. Alleluia!

Gospel: Mark 16:15-20

The Lord Jesus was taken into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God.

Jesus showed himself to the Eleven and said to them:

'Go out to the whole world; proclaim the Good News to all creation. He who believes and is baptised will be saved; he who does not believe will be condemned. These are the signs that will be associated with believers: in my name they will cast out devils; they will have the gift of tongues; they will pick up snakes in their hands, and be unharmed should they drink deadly poison; they will lay their hands on the sick, who will recover.'

And so the Lord Jesus, after he had spoken to them, was taken up into heaven: there at the right hand of God he took his place, while they, going out, preached everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the word by the signs that accompanied it.

Behold, I am with you always, even to the end of the age, alleluia.

COMPUTER OPERATORS



FEAST DAY THIS WEEK

Tuesday 14 May - St Matthias, apostle

St. Matthias the Apostle is the patron saint of alcoholics and carpenters. He was one of the twelve apostles chosen by the early Christian community to replace Judas Iscariot after his betrayal of Jesus.

St. Matthias is recognized as the patron saint of alcoholics because of his reputation for having overcome a weakness for drink. According to tradition, he struggled with alcohol in his earlier years, but through his faith and devotion he was able to overcome this weakness and become a steadfast disciple of Jesus. He is seen as a symbol of hope and inspiration for those who are struggling with addiction and seeking to turn their lives around.

In addition to being the patron saint of alcoholics, St. Matthias is also recognized as the patron saint of carpenters. This is because of the tradition that he was a carpenter by trade before becoming a disciple of Jesus. He is seen as a model of skilled craftsmanship and hard work, and his intercession is sought for guidance and inspiration for those who work in the construction
