She next plays into an Irish air, then a Bob Dylan folk song and finally a jazz improvisation of her own creation. She plays for an audience of one: a 70-year-old woman dying of cancer. The venue: the dying woman's room at the local hospice. Music is her ministry, providing a measure of peace and tranquillity for those taking the last steps from this world into eternity.

Most spring and summer nights, as soon as he gets home from the office, he heads to his small garden behind the garage. This quarter-acre is his favourite place on earth. He grows

tomatoes, beans and corn. He saves a few things for his own family; he shares the rest of the harvest of the good earth with needy families served by the local soup kitchen and pantry.


She suffered from bulimia as a teenager. Thanks to her wise and caring family, she overcame this devastating disease. Now a mother herself, she read about a support group for girls suffering from eating disorders. Every week she is there. She says very little; she is there to listen and to support, and when asked one-on-one by a girl who is terrified at what is happening to her, she offers the hope of her own story.

With their "walking sticks" — guitars, vegetable seeds, and their own stories and experiences — these three and so many others like them realize that Christ has sent them forth, like the Twelve in today's Gospel, to be his prophets of peace, apostles of compassion, ministers of healing (Source: A connection sampler)

The gospel presents to us a lifestyle that we should embrace. We are expected to make inroads in community and society at large not by exerting power over people, but by humanizing life, alleviating suffering and making freedom and solidarity grow. Each one of us is singled out for this specific task (mission) of making the world a little more as Jesus wants it to be.

"Plans are great but missions are better. Missions survive when plans fail, and plans almost always fail."

This mission consists of Proclaiming the Good News (through witnessing life), casting out the 'unclean spirits' (violence, intolerance, abuse, exploitation or manipulation, corruption, discrimination), embracing a simple lifestyle (a real challenge in today's materialistic world; contentment). As people are brainwashed today that access to the ultramodern sophistications, and accumulation of material wealth would make us secure in our life, the readings assert that we find real security in Jesus alone. Jesus made it very clear in his teachings that financial or material investments do not guarantee security in life.



What is important? A few years ago, at the Seattle Special Olympics, nine contestants, all physically or mentally disabled, assembled at the starting point for the 100-yard dash. At the gun they all started out, not exactly in a dash, but with the relish to run the race to the finish and win. All, that is, except one boy who stumbled on the asphalt, tumbled over a couple of times, and began to cry. The other eight heard the boy's cry. They slowed down and paused. Then they all turned around and went back. Every one of them. One girl with Down's syndrome bent down and

kissed him and said, "This will make it better." Then all nine linked arms and walked together to the finish line. Everyone in the stadium stood, and the cheering went on for ten minutes. God's blessings

HON'S BEBLE

Entrance Antiphon:

As for me, in justice I shall behold your face; I shall be filled with the vision of your glory.

First reading: Amos 7:12-15 'Go, prophesy to my people.

Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, said to Amos, 'Go away, seer;' get back to the land of Judah; earn your bread there, do your prophesying there. We want no more prophesying in Bethel; this is the royal sanctuary, the national temple.' 'I was no prophet, neither did I belong to any of the brotherhoods of prophets,' Amos replied to Amaziah 'I was a shepherd, and looked after sycamores: but it was the Lord who took me from herding the flock, and the Lord who said, "Go, prophesy to my people Israel."

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 84:9-14

R: Lord, show us your mercy and love, and grant us your salvation.

I will hear what the Lord has to say, a voice that speaks of peace, peace for his people.

His help is near for those who fear him and his glory will dwell in our land.

Mercy and faithfulness have met; justice and peace have embraced. Faithfulness shall spring from the earth and justice look down from heaven.

The Lord will make us prosper and our earth shall yield its fruit.

Justice shall march before him and peace shall follow his steps.

Second reading: Ephesians 1:3-14

Before the world was made, he chose us in Christ.

Blessed be God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with all the spiritual blessings of heaven in Christ.

Before the world was made, he chose us, chose us in Christ, to be holy and spotless, and to live through love in his presence, determined that we should become his adopted sons, through Jesus Christ for his own kind purposes,

to make us praise the glory of his grace,
his free gift to us in the Beloved,
in whom, through his blood, we gain our freedom,
the forgiveness of our sins.
Such is the richness of the grace
which he has showered on us

Gospel: Mark 6: 7-13

He called the Twelve, and began to send them out.

Jesus summoned the Twelve and began to send them out in pairs giving them authority over the unclean spirits. And he instructed them to take nothing for the journey except a staff – no bread, no haversack, no coppers for their purses. They were to wear sandals but, he added, 'Do not take a spare tunic.' And he said to them, 'If you enter a house anywhere, stay there until you leave the district. And if any place does not welcome you and people refuse to listen to you, as you walk away shake off the dust from under your feet as a sign to them.' So they set off to preach repentance; and they cast out many devils, and anointed many sick people with oil and cured them.

Research: Why Catholics don't attend Sunday Mass

The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference is undertaking a research project aimed at investigating why some Catholics do not participate in regular weekly Sunday Mass (Sunday Mass includes the Saturday Vigil). The project will provide in-depth information about contemporary religious practices and beliefs of

Catholics in Australia. The insights would enable parishes, movements, and school communities to respond to the trends in participation in the Church, update the Church's awareness and understanding of the present-day context, and enable responses and collaboration around the underlying factors for non/dis-engagement.

Those who meet the selection criteria for this survey are:

- 1. That they self-identify as Catholics and are 18 years and over.
- 2. That they do not regularly* attend weekly Mass on Sundays.
- *Regular weekly attendance is defined as physical attendance at Sunday Mass three or more times a month, including the Saturday vigil celebrated in many parishes.

Suitable participants may include parents of children in the parish school, family members of parishioners or other Catholic acquaintances who do not attend Mass regularly.

If our regular parishioners could share this with their family and friends, that would be appreciated.

The survey is anonymous and only aggregated results will be published. No identifiable information will be collected about participants. The survey takes approximately 6 -10 minutes to complete and will run from Monday, 17 June 2024 and close on Tuesday, 20 August 2024.
