


There was once a story about a teacher in English who asked her sophomore class what's the word denoting a marriage with many wives. A student answered, "Ma'am, polygamy." "Correct," she said. "How about a marriage with two spouses," another student replied, "Ma'am, it is bigamy." "Correct," the teacher said, "And how about a marriage with only one wife?" A student raised his hand and blurted out, "Ma'am, monotony!" Actually, what the student meant was "monogamy," of course. However, unwittingly his answer touched on a problem in marriage, that is, monotony.

Marriage is facing a variety of novel changes and challenges. Over the past decades, the understanding and definition of Marriage and family has been constantly evolving. With the new waves of thinking, there seems to be a hike in the rate of divorce which is quite alarming today. Divorce, separations have impacted the very fabric of the family and the children are enormously affected. As a result, the children struggle in forming their own adult relationships and they end up with behavioural problems in and out of the family. I need not elaborate the effects of divorce as you are witnessing it or going through it. At the same time, I cannot relegate women and children who suffer abuse and deprivation in the shadows; the children who are buckling under the weight of so many expectations and the fear of disappointing or reflecting badly on parents and mentors. "I hope that we as Church can honour the reality of these experiences and all of the emotions that come with them, without looking away or glossing it all over. I hope we can allow ourselves to transform these recesses and shadows into spaces of resistance and solidarity from which we might emerge sure of our dignity, sure of the Spirit moving through us, and sure of God's love".

Today's readings remind us of the value of marriage, family, and childlike trust in God. They call us to live with unity, respect, and dependence on God. By following these teachings, we can build stronger relationships and grow in our faith.

"A couple's life together -- a life centered in trust, forgiveness and love -- and their generous response to the vocation of parenthood, model the unfathomable and profound love of God: love that lets go rather than clings, love that happily gives rather than takes, love that liberates rather than confines. The sacrament of marriage, as Jesus taught, is a total giving and sharing by each



spouse so that the line between "his" and "hers" disappears into only "us." In the life they create together, life that sometimes means both taking on and letting go for the sake of the beloved, Christ is the ever-present wedding Guest, who makes their simple, everyday life together a miraculous sacrament, in which the love of God is revealed to all of us in this couple's love for one another"-

Within your will, O Lord, all things are established, and there is none that can resist your will. For you have made all things, the heaven and the earth, and all that is held within the circle of heaven; you are the Lord of all.

First reading: Genesis 2:18-24 *They were two in one flesh.*

The Lord God said, 'It is not good that the man should be

alone. I will make him a helpmate.' So from the soil the Lord God fashioned all the wild beasts and all the birds of heaven. These he brought to the man to see what he would call them; each one was to bear the name the man would give it. The man gave names to all the cattle, all the birds of heaven and all the wild beasts. But no helpmate suitable for man was found for him. So the Lord God made the man fall into a deep sleep. And while he slept, he took one of his ribs and enclosed it in flesh. The Lord God built the rib he had taken from the man into a woman, and brought her to the man. The man exclaimed:

'This at last is bone from my bones, and flesh from my flesh! This is to be called woman,

for this was taken from man.'

This is why a man leaves his father and mother and joins himself to his wife, and they become one body.

Second reading: Hebrews 2:9-11

He who sanctifies, and those who are sanctified have one origin.

We see in Jesus one who was for a short while made lower than the angels and is now crowned



with glory and splendour because he submitted to death; by God's grace he had to experience death for all mankind.

As it was his purpose to bring a great many of his sons into glory, it was appropriate that God, for whom everything exists and through whom everything exists, should make perfect, through suffering, the leader who would take them to their salvation. For the one who sanctifies, and the ones who are sanctified, are of the same stock; that is why he openly calls them brothers.

Gospel Acclamation : Alleluia! Alleluia!

If we love one another, God will live in us in perfect love. *Alleluia!*

Gospel: Mark 10:2-16

What God has joined together, no one must divide.

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'


People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.
