#### "DON'T JUST COUNT YOUR BLESSINGS. BE THE BLESSING OTHER PEOPLE COUNT ON"

Jerry was at a marriage seminar, and the leader of the seminar, a lady, was asking everybody how long they were married for. When it was Jerry's turn Jerry said that he was married for almost 50 years. "Wow" the leader gushed, "that's amazing, perhaps you can take a few minutes to share some insights with everybody, and how you stay married to the same woman for so long. "Well," Jerry said after thinking for a few moments, "I try to treat her nice, buy her presents, take her on trips...and best of all, for our 25th anniversary I took her to the Bahamas." "Well, that's really beautiful, and a true inspiration for all of us" the lady said. "Maybe you can tell us what you are going to do for your 50th anniversary" she said with a smile. "Well", Jerry said "I'm thinking of going back to the Bahamas to pick her up."

Who do we consider blessed in our contemporary time? Those who seem to have everything! The intelligent, goodlooking, socially and economically stable and well placed and connected in the public arena. Right! Is this type of valuation correct? Who in fact is truly blessed or cursed. (Mind that God never curses us...it is we ourselves in that situation).

Dr. Harold Treffert is the director of the Winnebago Mental Health Institute in Wisconsin. In an article entitled "The American Fairy Tale," he discusses five dangerous ideas we have about the meaning of happiness. First, happiness is things. The more you accumulate and have, the happier you will be. Second, happiness is what you do. The more you produce and earn, the happier you will be. Third, happiness is being the same as others. The more you are fashionable and conform with the times, the happier you will be. Fourth, happiness is mental health. The fewer problems you have and the more carefree you are, the happier you will be. Fifth, happiness is communicating with electronic gadgets. The more you can communicate with a television set, a satellite or a computer, the happier you will be. According to Dr. Treffert, these five myths about happiness are the cause of many mental health problems today. If happiness cannot be found through these five myths of "The American Fairy Tale," then where do we find it? Jesus gives us the answer when he outlines the beatitudes in today's reading from Luke. (Albert Cylwicki in His Word Resounds)

I think it is important to attend in particular to two things: the context in which the Beatitudes are pronounced and the biblical meaning of beatitude. The context is that Jesus is instructing his disciples before large crowds. Burdened and afflicted, these people have come from far and near to access his healing power (Luke 6:17-19). The implication is that the disciples, by adopting the values enshrined in the Beatitudes, are to become themselves instruments of hope and healing for this troubled wider group.

Strictly speaking, in the biblical tradition 'blessed' does not commend a moral attitude to be adopted. The formula declares a person to be in a fortunate or advantageous position. It almost amounts to 'Congratulations!' However, in the tradition of Israel the declaration of a person as 'blessed' is usually in view of a coming action of God.

The Prophet Jeremiah provides a background for this sense of being blessed or cursed. Blessedness is based on whether or not one puts one's trust in God. St Paul reiterates the same view in the second reading that those who are so obsessed only with the temporal life and happiness and hope for the same in Christ are the most pitiable people of all.

Coming to the Gospel, the beatitudes are highly provocative. The beatitudes and the woes make sense only in the light of the reversal of fortune to be brought about by God. In the canticle of Mary, the Magnificat, this is clearly anticipated: He casts the mighty from their thrones and raises the lowly. He fills the starving with good things, sends the rich away empty.

Besides the beatitudes implicate the truth that God is on the side of the poor and marginalised rather than the rich and powerful. Jesus challenges everything: our 'me -first' attitude, consumer -oriented, market driven, and what society holds dear today. Conversely, Jesus upholds selflessness, compassion and he invites us to embrace a new vision, a new fortune: to seek the common good before our own needs, to bring compassion and forgiveness to others despite our own anger and humiliation, to free ourselves from the pursuit of the things of this world in order to seek the lasting things of God. Jesus underlines that poverty and hunger are intrinsically evils and to be eradicated. (Sources are duly acknowledged)

#### First reading: Jeremiah 17:5-8

A curse on those who trust in humanity; a blessing on those who trust the Lord.

#### The Lord says this:

'A curse on the man who puts his trust in man, who relies on things of flesh, whose heart turns from the Lord. He is like dry scrub in the wastelands: if good comes, he has no eyes for it, he settles in the parched places of the wilderness, a salt land, uninhabited.

'A blessing on the man who puts his trust in the Lord, with the Lord for his hope. He is like a tree by the waterside that thrusts its roots to the stream: when the heat comes it feels no alarm, its foliage stays green; it has no worries in a year of drought, and never ceases to bear fruit.

#### Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 1:1-4

#### **R**: Happy are they who hope in the Lord.

Happy indeed is the man who follows not the counsel of the wicked; nor lingers in the way of sinners nor sits in the company of scorners, but whose delight is the law of the Lord and who ponders his law day and night.

He is like a tree that is planted beside the flowing waters, that yields its fruit in due season and whose leaves shall never fade; and all that he does shall prosper.

Not so are the wicked, not so! For they like winnowed chaff shall be driven away by the wind. For the Lord guards the way of the just but the way of the wicked leads to doom.

#### **Second reading:** 1 Corinthians 15:12, 16-20 If Christ is not raised from the dead, your faith is in vain.

If Christ raised from the dead is what has been preached, how can some of you be saying that there is no resurrection of the dead? For if the dead are not raised, Christ has not been raised, and if Christ has not been raised, you are still in your sins. And what is more serious, all who have died in Christ have perished. If our hope in Christ has been for this life only, we are the most unfortunate of all people.

But Christ has in fact been raised from the dead, the first-fruits of all who have fallen asleep.

Gospel: Luke 6:17, 20-26

#### Happy are the poor. Woe to the rich!

Jesus came down with the Twelve and stopped at a piece of level ground where there was a large gathering of his disciples with a great crowd of people from all parts of Judaea and from Jerusalem and from the coastal region of Tyre and Sidon who had come to hear him and to be cured of their diseases.

Then fixing his eyes on his disciples he said:

'How happy are you who are poor: yours is the kingdom of God.

Happy you who are hungry now: you shall be satisfied.

Happy you who weep now: you shall laugh.

'Happy are you when people hate you, drive you out, abuse you, denounce your name as criminal, on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice when that day comes and dance for joy, for then your reward will be great in heaven. This was the way their ancestors treated the prophets.
