"A LITTLE BIT OF MERCY MAKES THE WORLD LESS COLD AND MORE JUST."

- POPE FRANCIS

The gospel passage has different names, depending on which person in the story we refer to. If our focus is the elder son, then it is a parable of a Complaining Son; if the younger son, then it is a parable of a Prodigal Son. But if our focus is the father, who is the centre of the parable, it is viewed as a parable of a Merciful, Loving Father. The gospel is a story about breakups and reconciliation, about love that covers all sorts of happenings to the end. Emerson called this story, "The most beautiful short story in all of human literature." This is one of the stories that never grows old. It is so heart-warming and invigorating every time we hear or read it.

Reflection on the gospel, we find both the sons are self-centred. Both demonstrated their desire for satisfying themselves. On the one hand, the younger son is a squanderer, a wastrel. He took what is rightfully his, and spent everything. Well, it tells us of ourselves, that is, our greed or tendency to be greedy; inclined to be frivolous; on the other, the elder son is a complainer. He had the reason to complain to his father. This attitude also tells us about ourselves, that is, our own envy, jealousy, and resentment.

Secondly, it is the younger son who underwent a process of conversion. The virtues of humility and repentance are very much present in the younger son. As we have seen, the key to repentance is the humble admission of sin and guilt. At first blush, we find the younger son as more wicked than the elder son. But later, we can appreciate him for his sincere humility that he has committed a sin. I think we all agree that the humble admission of sin is something difficult for us to do because of pride. In relationships, whether in friendship, sibling relationship or husband-wife relationship, this is usually the case. There are small problems which become worse because no one admits that he or she is sinning. Our tendency is to show and prove that we are that perfect. If ever there is a problem, most people often blame others for the problem or for the sin committed. The first man, caught in the first sin, turns to blame his wife. And he extends the blame to God as well! He implies that he would have remained innocent if God hadn't put Eve in the garden with him.

The blame-shifting in the Garden continues today. Our proud hearts send us desperately looking for someone else to point to, every time we're confronted with our own sin. There must be someone else-our spouse, sibling, parent, boss, co-worker, pastor, friend, or God himself. We have to look for the good attitude of the younger son, that is, the humble admission of sin. We look for the capacity of the person to be humble.

Third, the father's attitude is something that we look forward to in the process of conversion. Pope John Paul II describes the Father as Rich in Mercy. This is something that he wants us to experience. The gospel today encourages us to love as we have been loved with the love that is merciful. People all do wrong - often great wrong. We need a lot of mercy in our families and country now, but we can't hold bitterness forever. The Sacrament of Reconciliation Jesus has given us, helps us in three ways: First, reconciliation with God. Second, reconciliation with our brothers and sister, reconciliation with oneself. One leads to the other. Our reconciliation with God is strongly dependent on our reconciliation with others and, of course, with ourselves. This sacrament is a blessing to all of us because it mediates God's grace to us. It is a coming home to the Father, it is an experience of being embraced with fatherly love. May I encourage our parishioners to avail the opportunity of experiencing the healing love of Jesus through the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) scheduled in our parish on 3rd April 5.30 pm and 7 pm. This Sunday's Readings



Entrance Antiphon:

Second reading: 2 Corinthians 5:17-21

God reconciled himself to us through Christ

For anyone who is in Christ, there is a new creation; the old creation has gone, and now the new one is here. It is all God's work. It was God who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the work of handing on this reconciliation. In other words, God in Christ was reconciling the world to himself, not holding men's faults against them, and he has entrusted to us the news that they are reconciled. So we are ambassadors for Christ; it is as though God were appealing through us, and the appeal that we make in Christ's name is: be reconciled to God. For our sake God made the sinless one into sin, so that in him we might become the goodness of God.

Gospel: Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

Your brother here was dead and has come to life.

The tax collectors and the sinners were all seeking the company of Jesus to hear what he had to say, and the Pharisees and the scribes complained. 'This man', they said, 'welcomes sinners and eats with them.' So he spoke this parable to them:

'A man had two sons. The younger said to his father, "Father, let me have the share of the estate that would come to me." So the father divided the property between them. A few days later, the younger son got together everything he had and left for a distant country where he squandered his money on a life of debauchery.

'When he had spent it all, that country experienced a severe famine, and now he began to feel the pinch, so he hired himself out to one of the local inhabitants who put him on his farm to feed the pigs. And he would willingly have filled his belly with the husks the pigs were eating but no one offered him anything. Then he came to his senses and said, "How many of my father's paid servants have more food than they want, and here am I dying of hunger! I will leave this place and go to my father and say: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as one of your paid servants." So he left the place and went back to his father.

'While he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was moved with pity. He ran to the boy, clasped him in his arms and kissed him tenderly. Then his son said, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you.

I no longer deserve to be called your son." But the father said to his servants, "Quick! Bring out the best robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the calf we have been fattening, and kill it; we are going to have a feast, a celebration, because this son of mine was dead and has come back to life; he was lost and is found." And they began to celebrate.

'Now the elder son was out in the fields, and on his way back, as he drew near the house, he could hear music and dancing. Calling one of the servants he asked what it was all about. "Your brother has come" replied the servant "and your father has killed the calf we had fattened because he has got him back safe and sound." He was angry then and refused to go in, and his father came out to plead with him; but he answered his father, "Look, all these years I have slaved for you and never once disobeyed your orders, yet you never offered me so much as a kid for me to celebrate with my friends. But, for this son of yours, when he comes back after swallowing up your property – he and his women – you kill the calf we had been fattening."

'The father said, "My son, you are with me always and all I have is yours. But it was only right we should celebrate and rejoice, because your brother here was dead and has come to life; he was lost and is found."'
