Dear sisters and brothers,

Believe, you had a blessed Easter and a joyful family reunion! The 2nd Sunday of Easter is also known as the 'Divine Mercy Sunday.' Our Lord Jesus Christ appeared to Sr. Faustina in the 1930's and promised that he would bestow his Divine Mercy to any sinner that totally repents his/her sins, no matter how grave and our Lord would not refuse any soul that seeks his mercy. Indeed, the Gospel reading leads us to discover the meaning of God's mercy. I would like to reflect on the character of Thomas, normally labelled as 'doubting Thomas.' When Jesus appeared to the disciples for the first time after his resurrection, he was not there. No one really knows why Thomas was missing on that Sunday evening. Maybe he wanted to be alone with his own grief over the death of Jesus. But whatever the reason, he wasn't there. Thomas was a complex man of courage and fear; of knowledge and ignorance; of faith and doubt. So, when the others reported on Jesus' incredible appearance, 'their mere say-so wasn't enough.' He couldn't trust their word; he had to see and…he had to touch for himself.

Thank God for Thomas. He spoke up when the others were silent, when the others kept their doubts to themselves. His response was rational and logical. He was a proof-seeker who put conditions on his belief. Thomas takes the words right out of our mouths and gives voice to every doubt and every question that we have about our faith in Christ. We don't find it any easier to live by faith than he did. Thomas gives us the chance to think about the demands we place on believing or not believing in the resurrection. Thank God for Thomas who stands in for all of us who want to see something for ourselves before we decide if it's true. He was honest to admit that he had struggles to believe in the resurrection of Jesus. A week later, the story was different. He saw and he believed that Jesus had risen from the dead. The resurrection was the key message.

Thomas can be there for anyone who finds it almost impossible to make that leap of faith to believe in the resurrection. There may be many reasons for having such difficulty: Things like that just don't happen.

- · We live in an age of fantasy worlds, virtual reality, and sensational claims about products from toothpaste to healing crystals why should this one be true?
- · We all have memories of being hurt of people letting us down, hopes being dashed.
- · There's fear of the unknown, what life would be like if we did believe, the demands such a belief might make of us and anxiety about what other people might think.

Thomas offers us the message that somehow if we hang on to Jesus, he will reveal himself and make us powerful and motivated to move on. It may not happen in a single moment as it did for Thomas, it may be a gradual growth in faith and conviction over a long period of time. However, it happens, conviction in the resurrection of Jesus can change us and our lives as surely as it changed the apostles all those years ago. The question is, will we allow that change and growth to happen in ourselves and other people?

Let's hope so because a life lived in the light of the resurrection is a new and exciting life to be lived in all its fullness and with the risen Christ alongside saying: "My peace be with you". Amen.

This Sunday's Readings



Entrance Antiphon:

Receive the joy of your glory, giving thanks to God, who has called you into the heavenly kingdom, alleluia.

First reading: Acts 5:12-16

The numbers of men and women who came to believe in the Lord increased steadily.

The faithful all used to meet by common consent in the Portico of Solomon. No one else ever dared to join them, but the people were loud in their praise and the numbers of men and women who came to believe in the Lord increased steadily. So many signs and wonders were worked among the people at the hands of the apostles that the sick were even taken out into the streets and laid on beds and sleeping-mats in the hope that at least the shadow of Peter might fall across some of them as he went past. People even came crowding in from the towns round about Jerusalem, bringing with them their sick and those tormented by unclean spirits, and all of them were cured.

Responsorial Psalm: 117:2-4, 22-27

R: Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, his love is everlasting.

Let the sons of Israel say:
'His love has no end.'
Let the sons of Aaron say:

Let those who fear the Lord say:

Second reading: Apocalypse 1:9-13, 17-19

I was dead, and now I am to live for ever and ever.

My name is John, and through our union in Jesus I am your brother and share your sufferings, your kingdom, and all you endure. I was on the island of Patmos for having preached God's word and witnessed for Jesus; it was the Lord's day and the Spirit possessed me, and I heard a voice behind me, shouting like a trumpet, 'Write down all that you see in a book.'

I turned round to see who had spoken to me, and when I turned I saw seven golden lampstands and, surrounded by them, a figure like a Son of man, dressed in a long robe tied at the waist with a golden girdle.

When I saw him, I fell in a dead faint at his feet, but he touched me with his right hand and said, 'Do not be afraid; it is I, the First and the Last; I am the Living One, I was dead and now I am to live for ever and ever, and I hold the keys of death and of the underworld. Now write down all that you see of present happenings and things that are still to come.'

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, Alleluia!

You believe in me, Thomas, because you have seen me; happy are those who have not seen me, but still believe! *Alleluia!*

Gospel: John 20:19-31

After eight days Jesus came in and stood among them.

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you', and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.

'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit.

For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me.

Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

Communion Antiphon:

Bring your hand and feel the place of the nails, and do not be unbelieving but believing, alleluia.
