Today, we are celebrating the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ. This special Feast is celebrated in remembrance of Jesus who gave His life for our salvation and commanded us to celebrate the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist in his memory. The Feast owes its existence to Blessed Juliana of Liege, who began a devotion to the Blessed Sacrament in around 1230. Largely through her insistence, in 1264 Pope Urban 1V commanded its observance by the universal church. The Feast sums up three important confessions about our Faith. First is that God became physically present in the person of Christ, True God and True Man. Secondly, God continues to be present in His people as form the Mystical Body of Christ in his church. And thirdly, the presence of God under the form of bread and wine is made available to us on the altar at Mass and preserved there for our nourishment and worship. (Fr. Eugene Lobo S.J)

No family event goes without a meal and a drink which is a cause for great joy and happiness. We share the meals, tell our stories with each other and we create memories. Family meals have a tremendous transforming power which cannot be ignored, or dismissed or underestimated. Jesus was very fond of eating and celebrating. There are many times in the gospels where we are told that he sat and ate with people. He sought out and ate with those who were despised and excluded; the tax collectors, the sick and the poor. This became such a feature of his daily life that some of the Pharisees and Scribes even said, 'This man welcomes sinners and eats with them'. The story of the multiplication of bread is not a lakeside family picnic but rather a story about a mind -boggling gathering of people who live in chaos and whose daily fare was hardly more than a subsistence serving of food. Jesus ministers to all their needs with a warm welcome, uplifting teaching, compassionate healing, and sufficient physical nourishment for everyone without food to spare 12 full baskets. This is what Eucharist is all about: Eucharist is the place where we are welcomed by the Lord. Eucharist is where the word of hope is shared with us. Eucharist is where we gather in the brokenness for healing. And Jesus gives himself as a gift to every one of us. As Pope Francis said, "The Eucharist is not a prize for the perfect but a powerful medicine and nourishment for the weak'. The Eucharist is a food gifted for us which becomes the food for our soul and life and thereby Jesus becomes the centre of our hearts. When Jesus is in our hearts, we are changed and we become the body of Christ. As the Church, the People of God, we are the Body of Christ. And we have to become the body of Christ, the Eucharist for one and another. The words of St. Augustine, an early church writer echoes down through the centuries to us; 'Believe what you see, see what you believe and become what you are, the Body of Christ. When we say 'amen' we are saying, yes, I believe this is the Body and Blood of Jesus and I will become the Body of Christ for others.

The miracle of the multiplication is an act out of the ordinary and astonishing. Many wonder if Jesus truly multiplied the loaves, or if the miracle was the sharing of goods already present with all gathered. Whatever it may be, in these days as we face violence, war, crimes, illness, scarcity of food and basic needs in many countries, the greater miracle would be to trust God enough to share our goods, fullness, littleness, or even our weakness with our sisters and brothers. Then we will marvel that we belong to each other as St Mother Theresa used to say. We need to work at being together and to keep reminding ourselves of the why. On this great Church feast, may we not only receive the Body and Blood of Christ in faith, may we also realise deeply that we are the Body of Christ in and for the world today. Then one dark night the two brothers bumped into each other. Slowly it dawned on them what was happening. They dropped their sacks and embraced each other. Second reading: 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

Every time you eat this bread and drink this cup, you are proclaiming the death of the Lord.

This is what I received from the Lord, and in turn passed on to you: that on the same night that he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took some bread, and thanked God for it and broke it, and he said, 'This is my body, which is for you; do this as a memorial of me.' In the same way he took the cup after supper, and said, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Whenever you drink it, do this as a memorial of me.' Until the Lord comes, therefore, every time you eat this bread and drink this cup, you are proclaiming his death.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, Alleluia!

I am the living bread from heaven, says the Lord; whoever eats this bread will live for ever.

Gospel: Luke 9:11-17


They all ate and were filled.

Jesus made the crowds welcome and talked to them about the kingdom of God; and he cured those who were in need of healing.

It was late afternoon when the Twelve came to him and said, 'Send the people away, and they can go to the villages and farms round about to find lodging and food; for we are in a lonely place here.' He replied, 'Give them something to eat yourselves.' But they said, 'We have no more than five loaves and two fish, unless we are to go ourselves and buy food for all these people.' For there were about five thousand men. But he said to his disciples, 'Get them to sit down in parties of about fifty.' They did so and made them all sit down. Then he took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven, and said the blessing over them; then he broke them and handed them to his disciples to distribute among the crowd. They all ate as much as they wanted, and when the scraps remaining were collected they filled twelve baskets.
