FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT, YEAR A

Sunday, 22 March 2026

**“From dry bones a people are born, from fear a movement arises,
from crisis a new creation emerges.”**

On this fifth Sunday of Lent, the Word of God presents us with two powerful images of life snatched from death: the valley of dry bones in Ezekiel and the tomb of Lazarus in Bethany. Both speak of situations that seem hopeless, where life has withdrawn and only inert matter remains. Yet in both cases, God does not allow death to have the last word.

Through the prophet Ezekiel, the Lord addresses a people in exile who feel like a nation already buried: “I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people” (Ezekiel 37:12). Israel is not only wounded or discouraged; it is as if dead. Exile, oppression and humiliation have drained the people of their breath. But God promises more than comfort: he promises resurrection. “I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live” (Ezekiel 37:14). Life returns when God breathes his Spirit into what seemed lost forever.

This prophecy does not concern only ancient Israel. It applies to all situations where systems of exploitation, violence or neglect reduce people to “dry bones,” deprived of dignity, voice and hope. Entire communities today live as if locked in a tomb: crushed by ecological destruction, forced displacement, debt or economic structures that prioritize profit at the expense of people. Their lands are ravaged, their rivers polluted, their ways of life stifled. From the outside, one might think that nothing new can sprout there.

In this reality, the Gospel of the resurrection of Lazarus resonates with the same force. Jesus does not remain distant from death. He goes to Bethany, stands before a sealed tomb, and weeps. His tears are not a sign of weakness, but of divine compassion. Before calling Lazarus out of the tomb, Jesus accepts the pain of Martha, Mary and the whole community. He enters into their mourning. Then he cries out in a loud voice, “Lazarus, come out!” (John 11:43). The one who was bound by funeral bandages comes out of the tomb. But the story does not end there. Jesus turns to those around him and says, “Unbind him, and let him go” (John 11:44). The miracle involves the community. They must help remove the signs of death and return Lazarus to life among his own. This is where the Word connects with our mission. We are called to untie others. Faith in the God of life cannot remain abstract or disembodied. It draws us to those whose lives have been emptied by unjust systems, communities wounded by extractive industries, environmental degradation, crushing poverty and exclusion. Here are a couple of true stories of transitioning from hopelessness to hope by the grace of God often involve individuals hitting absolute rock bottom—emotionally, physically, or spiritually—before experiencing a profound, divine intervention that shifts their perspective from despair to purpose.

· *Following a devastating accident in Hawaii that left him unable to move his limbs, Judah broke his neck in three places and his back in five. Overwhelmed by pain, isolation, and the terrifying reality of his injuries, he reached a point of wanting to end his life. In his darkest moment, he turned to God, finding solace in prayer. Through a long and arduous rehabilitation, Judah experienced a “miracle” healing, defying medical odds to stand again. He now attributes his recovery to God’s presence, viewing his ordeal as a platform for sharing hope and his future with purpose.*

· *A woman who was severely abused as a child and struggling with intense depression and suicidal thoughts felt she was “too far gone”. She described her life as “meaningless” and was trapped in a cycle of rage, numbness, and darkness. At age 10, she was introduced to the message of Jesus’ love, which began to turn her sorrow into joy. Through the grace of God, she was able to forgive her abuser and, despite a lingering, difficult childhood, she was rescued from that environment, eventually leading a Bible study, and finding true hope.*

Lent leads us to the cross, where death seems to triumph. Let us experience the life-transforming love of Jesus in our lives and uplift the hopeless people (dry bones) with the love and grace of Jesus Christ!

Second reading: Romans 8:8-11

*If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is
living in you, then he will give life to your own mortal
bodies.*

People who are interested only in unspiritual things can
never be pleasing to God. Your interests, however, are
not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit
of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you
possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to
him. Though your body may be dead it is because of sin,
but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself
because you have been justified; and if the Spirit of him
who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he
who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own
mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.

Gospel: John 11:1-45

I am the resurrection and the life

The sisters sent this message to Jesus, 'Lord, the man you love
is ill.' On receiving the message, Jesus said, 'This sickness will
end not in death but in God's glory, and through it the Son of
God will be glorified.'

Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, yet when he
heard that Lazarus was ill he stayed where he was for two
more days before saying to the disciples, 'Let us go to Judaea.'

On arriving, Jesus found that Lazarus had been in the tomb for
four days already. When Martha heard that Jesus had come
she went to meet him. Mary remained sitting in the house.
Martha said to Jesus, 'If you had been here, my brother would
not have died, but I know that, even now, whatever you ask of
God, he will grant you.' 'Your brother' said Jesus to her 'will
rise again.' Martha said, 'I know he will rise again at the
resurrection on the last day.' Jesus said:

'I am the resurrection and the life.

*If anyone believes in me, even though he dies he will live,
and whoever lives and believes in me will never die.
Do you believe this?'*

'Yes, Lord,' she said 'I believe that you are the Christ, the Son
of God, the one who was to come into this world.'

Jesus said in great distress, with a sigh that came straight from
the heart, 'Where have you put him?' They said, 'See how much
he loved him!' But there were some who remarked, 'He opened
the eyes of the blind man, could he not have prevented this
man's death?' Still sighing, Jesus reached the tomb: it was a
cave with a stone to close the opening. Jesus said, 'Take the
stone away.' Martha said to him, 'Lord, by now he will smell;
this is the fourth day.' Jesus replied, 'Have I not told you that if
you believe you will see the glory of God?' So they took away
the stone. Then Jesus lifted up his eyes and said:

'Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer.

I knew indeed that you always hear me.

*But I speak for the sake of all these who stand round me,
so that they may believe it was you who sent me.'*

When he had said this, he cried in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, here!
Come out!' The dead man came out, his feet and hands bound
with bands of stuff and a cloth round his face. Jesus said to
them, 'Unbind him, let him go free.' Many of the Jews who had
come to visit Mary and had seen what he did believed in him.

The Office of Tenebrae

As mentioned in the Ways to Participate Information Sheet (bulletin insert 3 weeks ago), this reflective Holy Week liturgy of Scripture, psalm chanting, and sacred music will be held on

Monday, 30 March 2026

at St Patrick's Cathedral, 1 Marist Place Parramatta,
from 7:30pm - 8:30pm.

It will also be livestreamed via St Patrick's Cathedral Parramatta's
YouTube channel.

Tenebrae is a solemn service where 15 candles (representing the twelve Apostles, Mary, the Mother of Jesus, Mary Magdalene, and one for Christ) are gradually extinguished. The final Christ candle is hidden to signify His burial, followed by the strepitus (a sudden loud noise), which is then made to evoke the earthquake and confusion that followed the Crucifixion. The candle is returned at the end, pointing toward the hope of the Resurrection.

While this service is not a pilgrimage organised by our parish, it is offered as a meaningful Lenten pilgrimage opportunity.
